Gone are the days of the shoe shine, when you could walk down the street and find any young man with a box and a rag who could make your shoes look as good as new. In the 1930s *boot blacks* were in most urban areas, [bus stations, and airports] and at that time there was also a confluence of the old-world meeting with the new world. Holdovers from the 19th century were still hanging out and telling stories about the last half of the 1800s.

It must have been an amazing time for a young boy to be earning a wage as a boot black. Not only were stories of the old world afoot, but the world was changing at a major rate!

God's Abraham Lincoln

Following our September meeting, I discovered the following bulletin insert that was included in a recent funeral service for a friend that was a Lincoln fan, named Skip Shaffer from Spring City, PA. Hope you enjoy it as much as my late friend cherished it:



It has been said that after Christ, Abraham Lincoln was the greatest man that ever walked the earth. Lloyd George of England, said: "In his life he was a great American . . . in death, he belongs to the common people of every land."

When he addressed an audience it seemed as though a great organ was playing in the subdued light of an immense cathedral. The dignity, the purity and the profoundness of his speech held his listeners as in a trance. His Gettysburg address and his speech of acceptance at his second inaugural straightway passed into the list of classics in our language.

As a boy, the Bible and Pilgrim's Progress were

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among the first five books he owned and read. With a buzzard's quill for a pen and some pokeberry juice for ink, he copied many of their passages of wisdom and beauty into his note-book. He lived with these books and the effect of this association was apparent early in his young manhood. The story is told by his friend, Cap. Gilbert J. Greene that:

"One day, Mr. Lincoln said to me, 'Gilbert, there is a woman dangerously ill, fifteen miles in the country, who has sent for me to write her will. I should like to have you go with me.' I cheerfully accepted the invitation. When we arrived, the woman had but a few hours to live. After the will had been written, signed and witnessed, the dying woman said to Mr. Lincoln: "Now, I have my affairs of this world in order and I have also made preparation for the life to come. I do not fear death. I am glad that I am soon to meet those who have gone before.'

"Mr. Lincoln replied, 'Your faith is wise and strong. Your hope of a future life is blessed.' She asked him if he would read a few verses from the Bible. They offered him the Book, but he laid it aside and began reciting from memory the twenty-third psalm. Then he quoted the first part of the fourteenth chapter of John, 'In my Father's house are many mansions; if it were not so, I would have told you. . .' After he had given these and other quotations from the Scriptures, he recited several hymns, closing with 'Rock of Ages, Cleft for Me.'

"A little while later the woman passed to her reward. As we rode home in the buggy, I expressed surprise that he should have acted as pastor as well as attorney so perfectly, and he replied. 'God and eternity were very near me today.'" One hardly need ask why this, then almost unknown, frontier lawyer rose to such a position of eminence; why the great leaders of his party, the most experienced and accomplished public men of the day, were made to stand aside while this man was led by unseen hands to the front and given the reins of power at such a critical time in our nation's history. One realizes that those unseen hands were the hands of God; for this man was God's man.

We see him in the White House during the dark days of the Civil war, the weight of grave problems almost too much to bear. He said of those times, "I have been driven many times to my knees by the overwhelming conviction that I had nowhere else to go. My own wisdom, and that of all about me, seem insufficient for that day."

He sought prayers of others in behalf of himself and his nation. On one occasion he awoke his minister at half-past one in the morning and brought him to the White House, saying: "I need you!" The minister went and found the President's room strewn with maps, where he was marking out the movements of troops. He said to the minister: "There is your room, you go in there and pray, and I will stay here and watch." Three times during the night the President knelt beside the minister and prayed mightily to God to bless the boys about to die for the Republic, and to save the Republic.

Through his guidance the nation found, as he had hoped, a new birth of freedom under God; and like his beloved Saviour, he gave his life for the cause for which he was brought forth.

Chauncey Depew said, "I was one of the committee in charge of the funeral train which was bearing his body to his home . . . As we sped

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over the rails at night the scene was the most pathetic ever witnessed. At every cross-road the glare of innumerable torches illuminated the whole population, from age to infancy, kneeling on the ground, and their clergymen leading in prayers and hymns."

So passed the greatest mortal man in history, God's Abraham Lincoln. The soil from which he came is our soil; the nation that he loved and served is our nation; the Book which guided him is our Book; the God whose hand he held is our God. With all this as our heritage, and with the example, the inspiration and the light of his life before us, we dare not fail. Let us look to God from whence came his strength, that no new Daniel shall arise to cry, "Thou art weighed in the balance and art found wanting." —From Ambassador Tracts. First Mate Bob
