Meeting was called to order at 2:05 pm.

Treasurer's report: Brother Demmy discussed the expense of a replacement printhead for camp's printer. Brother Demmy also suggested possibly of procuring an additional small fund CD at our financial institution and suggested that Camp Council discuss the matter further.

Post meeting note: Camp Council brothers have all agreed the need and benefit of purchasing an additional small fund CD at Members 1st. Council brother Jeff Smith will research the current rates and suggest the amount to invest and length of a new CD!

Old and new business:

Brother Demmy has reserved the banquet room with the museum and arranged the catering for our upcoming holiday banquet. We expect around thirty guests on Sunday December 12th in the banquet room of the National Civil War Museum! Brother Stout discussed with the camp the upcoming need to reproduce more license plates and the possibility of other SUVCW products the camp may want to explore. Additionally, Brother Stout shared with the camp about the poor state of

the Lincoln Cemetery at 30th street in Penbrook, [the village next to Reservoir Park] and the possibility of the Camp doing something to assist.

A reminder was made for the State's mid-year meeting on October 23rd.

For the good of the order:

Three of the camp's brothers shared the stories and artifacts of their father's service during the Second World War.

Brother Dan Lute shared his father's naval uniform and pictures of the vessel on which he served heroically rescuing survivors from a tanker ship that was shortly to explode.

Brother Bill Jackson shared a Minute Man award his father received for his successful campaigning for war bonds along with a real German helmet that was used during the drives. His father later enlisted (although he was older than most volunteering) and served in Europe where he was to make the ultimate sacrifice for his country during the crossing of the Rhine.

Brother Jackson also shared the hat and headset of his childhood hero and neighbor who served in the Army Air Corp and who completed many dangerous missions over occupied Europe and Germany.

Brother Demmy shared about his father and late camp member Floyd Demmy who served in Europe on (or walking behind) a half-track, fighting through Germany. Brother Demmy shared his father's bronze star as well as ration books and several pictures of his father taken during combat. Floyd wrote a wonderful book about his experiences during the war and Brother Demmy offered to share the book via email or hardcopy as requested.

These are just 4 soldiers out of the millions who served during that war. It is no wonder why the men and women of that time are known as the Greatest Generation. See images below........

Camp closed with the text of our organization's Rituals and Ceremonies. After cleaning up the area, a number of brothers departed the building for Longhorn Restaurant with additional conversations and Brother Logan and Brother Bill had a good time discussing the areas in which they grew up in Pennsylvania. South Carolina State Heritage Act

SC Supreme Court has upheld most of the SC Heritage Act, with the exception of the requirement that any changes to a monument need the approval of 2/3 of the state legislature. (This last part wasn't expected to be upheld anyway.) As you recall, the SUVCW joined a number of other patriotic heritage organizations in an *amicus curiae* brief in support of

the Act in Oct 2020, the first such action we undertook under the new monument protection policy. Below are links to an article and to the decision itself.

Rational Dress Society and Victorian Dress Reform

In 1881, a group of high society women gathered in London to form a new organization. They named their group the <u>Rational Dress Society</u>, intending to reform Victorian women's dress. The group came up with <u>criteria for the perfect dress</u>. It included:

- 1. Freedom of Movement
- 2. Absence of pressure over any part of the body
- 3. No more weight than is necessary for warmth, and both weight and warmth evenly distributed.
- 4. Grace and beauty combined with comfort and convenience
- 5. Not departing too conspicuously from the ordinary dress of the time



Their ideas were revolutionary and controversial. Typical Victorian dress styles incorporated heavy fabrics, tight corsets, bustles, hoop skirts, and extravagant ornamentation. The women argued that dress reform would allow them participate in activities like cycling. Bicycles had become a symbol of freedom for many women who found the sport liberating and emancipating. Lady Harberton, A founding

member of the society was Viscountess Florence Wallace Pomeroy, also known as Lady Harberton.

Lady Harberton, the daughter of wealthy

landowners, married James S. Pomeroy. He later became the 6th Viscount Harberton. In 1880, Lady Harberton took up the cause of dress reform. She loved to cycle, but heavy, long skirts prevented her from enjoying the activity. She championed the reformed dress, which consisted of baggy pantaloons worn underneath a kneelength skirt. She also invented the divided skirt, which initially evoked jeers on both sides of the pond. Some feared that trifling with a traditional women's dress was a step down a path to loosening moral values.

In 1883, the Rational Dress Society sponsored an exhibition held in London. The exhibit included shorter dresses, divided skirts, "costumes for climbing for lady mountaineers, and a costume for walking." One man reported to *The Times* that the women in his family discarded their corsets and found new freedom in dancing, walking, tricycling, lawn tennis, and other openair exercises. They vowed never to return to corsets and

heavy skirts. Attitudes for many women (and men) were undergoing a seismic shift.

The "woman of the future" wanted freedom in her clothing – and freedom within other aspects of her life. The struggle for rational dress came to a head after an incident in 1898. Lady Harberton went cycling in Surrey. She stopped for lunch at the Hautboy Hotel but away for improper was turned dress. Harberton sued the hotel but lost the case because the hotel had offered alternative seating in the bar. Nevertheless, the case brought attention to rational dress and a victory for women who advocated for it. Lady Harberton spent decades promoting clothing that would make life easier for women. Later in her life, she also became an advocate for the women's suffrage 1911. The movement. Lady Harberton died in Guardian eulogized her as an "enthusiastic and undaunted advocate" for dress reform.

A number of brothers offered and displayed a quantity of WWII items and provided short discussion on the items they presented for the enjoyment of the camp officers and brothers in the audience.

Brother Dan Lute displayed his father's WWII dress Navy uniform and photo(s). a brother remarked about how small the uniform was and that during the 1940's the general population of men in the US were generally small and medium Brother Bill Jackson, founder of the Central Penn WWII Round Table located in Hummelstown, outside of Hershey PA, had a number of items on display and appropriate stories to accompany his items, one was a WWII German helmet.

David Demmy, Sr., had a large number of items on display, mostly from his late father's collection including books and collectable toy size reproductions of military vehicles. Floyd was a replacement during WWII and was a rifleman with the 54th Armored Infantry Battalion, assigned to the 10th Armored Division, under the command of George Patton. Floyd traveled across France on a deuce and half truck to catch up with the 10th Armored Division.





Sherman tank utilized by 10th Armored Division.
