**Four Chaplains** shared by William Jackson, founder of the Central Pennsylvania WWIII Round Table in Hummelstown PA

As regular readers of my column featured in [the Sun, Hummelstown PA] know, I am a military history enthusiast. As such, I'm well aware that just when you think you've learned everything about some person, battle, incident, etc., you learn how far from the truth that can be. Such was the case when, at our Central Pennsylvania WWII Roundtable meeting, I picked up a flyer titled, "Legacy of Four Chaplains live on through scholarship recipient." I've long known the story of the World War II tragedy of what became known as "The Four Chaplains." It was Feb. 3, 1943, and the U.S. Army Transport Dorchester was sunk in the icy North Atlantic Ocean on its way to a base off of the coast of Greenland. On board were 902 troops, among them four Army chaplains: Lt. George L. Fox, Methodist; Lt. Alexander D. Goode, Jewish; Lt. John P. Washington, Roman Catholic; and Lt. Clark V. Poling, Dutch Reformed.

Survivors reported that as the ship sank, the four chaplains first gave their life jackets to others, then linked arms and continued to offer prayers and messages of encouragement and courage until they were swept under. Of the 902 on board, 230 survived to tell the story of the tragedy and of the heroic actions by the four chaplains. This became a legend and led to the creation of the Chapel of the Four Chaplains in Philadelphia, which Rosemary and I visited some years ago with our great friend and World War II veteran, the late Harry Trefz of Hummelstown.

What I didn't know and learned from the flyer was that Lt. Goode, the Jewish rabbi, had been the rabbi for the York, Pa. Jewish Temple and the Alexander D. Goode Elementary School in the York City School District is named in his honor. It also led to the creation of the Four Chaplains Prayer Breakfast in York, now some 30 years ago, to honor the Four Chaplains and in particular, Rabbi Goode. This has grown into an annual event attended by hundreds, raising thousands of dollars for York City student scholarships and an endowment fund with the York County Community Foundation. Each year the organization awards scholarships to York City students. At a recent Breakfast, the 2004 Four Chaplains Scholarship recipient, now Dr. Tana Freeland Andre, was

honored. She is a psychiatrist at an inpatient hospital in suburban Philadelphia. A William Penn Senior High School 2004 graduate, she also attended the Alexander D. Goode Elementary School in York. She recalled, "It was never just a name on the building. We were taught who the Four Chaplains were and why it was important to live by their example. What the Four Chaplains stood for in their actions really resonated with me. I often keep that in mind: We are not here simply to serve ourselves but to serve others." #### FORM OF HAND **SALUTE** IN CIVIL WAR

According to regulations, the hand salute rendered by the U.S. soldier during the Civil War resembled the British salute, i.e., with the palm facing outward. Article XXXIX of Army Regulations for 1857,1861, and 1863 specifically prescribe that the soldier without arms or with just side-arms will "...raise his hand to the right side of the visor of his cap, palm to the front, elbow raised as high as the shoulder...." The Confederate soldier followed the same procedure. See: Confederate States of America. Army Regulations, Adopted for Use of the Army of the Confederate States.... Richmond: West & Johnston, 1861. Article XXIX, pp. 23-25. U113.5C76.

The 1863 Regulations remained in force until superseded by these of 1881. Emory Upton's new system of infantry tactics, officially adopted by the War Dept in 1867, prescribed hand salutes with "the palm of the hand down" in Lesson II. The proposed regulations of 1873 and those actually adopted in 1881 omitted the earlier specifications for hand salutes and instructed the soldier to simply raise his hand to his cap



An extract from our Charter, Constitution, and Regulations:

#### Article II Membership

Section 3 (a). A Brother whose dues are not paid by March 1 may be dropped for nonpayment of dues ...... by Camp. A Brother so dropped shall not be admitted to another Camp or membership-at-large unless having received the concurrence of the Camp which dropped him.

A Brother so dropped from the rolls of a Camp shall be issued a General Discharge for the Good of the Order. <sup>24</sup> A Brother may be reinstated by paying the current year's dues [camp and department] plus a [national] reinstatement fee of ten dollars (\$10.00)!

For 2023 until any future increase in per capita, the total reinstatement for national purposes will be 33 +10 =\$43.00 all-year-long and may not be prorated.
