Extra Ice Please: A Cool History of the 19th Century Ice collections and delivery . . .

How many of you grew up on a farm or visited a farm to know there was a body of water [perhaps only a small crick or creek or spring]



that supplied water to the farm; and the farm had an icehouse near the water supply! The icehouse or spring house was used to collect water and to store

ice to serve the farm during hot weather. The blocks of ice were separated by saw dust or straw – yucky!

More from an extract from *newspapers.com*:

Nothing beats an ice-cold drink on a hot summer day, but during the 19th century, ice was a rare luxury. The ice trade transformed ice luxury into a booming global industry. Beginning in the 1800s and lasting into the early 1900s, it involved harvesting ice from frozen lakes and rivers, storing it in <u>icehouses</u>, and <u>transporting it via ship</u>, barge, or railroad to destinations worldwide.


America's Growing Appetite for Ice: Though still a luxury item, ice became increasingly popular. Ice helped preserve food and enabled the shipment of perishables by rail or wagon. Chicago's meatpacking industry used ice to refrigerate rail cars, helping to distribute fresh meat nationwide. Americans were introduced to new foods and drinks that were not previously available.

The Record of January 4, 1870 Ice Comes Home:

Once harvested, ice was stored in ice houses. Some wealthier families built their own; others bought ice from commercial vendors. A network of ice wagons delivered ice directly to homes, where it was used in iceboxes to preserve food. Children often chased after the wagons, hoping for a free sliver of ice to enjoy. [This authors parents lived uptown Harrisburg and had ice box door in the front of their row homes for the delivery of ice



from a horse drawn wagon!

AN EDITORIAL FOLLOWS

It rained in Hummelstown last night!

It rained in Hummelstown last night! Where were you? This camp newsletter editor was at the monthly meeting of the Central Pennsylvania World War II Round Table at Hummelstown PA, near Hershey PA.

The speaker of the evening was brother Bill Jackson of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. Circa 1998 Brother Bill co-founded the Hershey Civil War Round Table.



In a few years, his interest in America's World War II began to flourish and during 2003 he founded the Central Pennsylvania World War II Round Table in Hummelstown.

Last night Bill had several pages of notes, but not once during his hour-long speech

did he refer to those pages. He spoke nonstop about his youth; his WW II veteran father, William K Jackson; his early education in Texas; his continued education at Valley Forge Military Academy, PA; a few military heroes; and his purchase and operation of *The Sun*, Hummelstown's newspaper.

Bill noted that his father was the director of the civil defense in their hometown, Clearfield, PA, and rumors circulated that William was not serving in the military like so many of the men of America. Upon hearing the gossip, William at age 36, immediately enlisted, trained and was assigned to duty in the European Theater. Bill's father was killed in action.

Years later Bill himself would serve in the US Army in Germany and would travel to his father's gravesite with a military photography to capture the story which appeared on the front cover the *Stars and Stripes* – the US Army official newspaper.

During Bill's story, he mentioned a classmate named Norman, who went into the army and later was nicknamed General *Stormin Norman Schwarzkopf Jr.,* who led all coalition forces in the Gulf War against Ba'athist Iraq.

Bill continued with another Army hero who popped into his publishers' office once upon a time: WW II Major Richard Winters. Dick said to Bill, "You must know all the secrets of Hershey and Hummelstown! We need to do lunch"! Facetiously, Dick also revealed he was mentioned in a book named *Band of Brothers*. 2011 Bill would provide the eulogy for the late Dick Winters.

Bill and his wife Rosemary eventually sold *The Sun*, but Bill continues to author an article each week for the newspaper, "Where I sit." Most of his articles are about cars, the military and, of course, the local history of the Hummelstown/Hershey/Harrisburg area.

Happy Birthday William 'Bill' Jackson, member of Major General John F Hartranft Camp 15 serving the Harrisburg PA area since 1882. Bill became 91 yesterday, September 4, 2025.
