Hartranft deceased in October

[John F. Hartranft \(1830 – 1889\)](#) served as Governor of Pennsylvania, 1872-1879. Born in Montgomery County, Pennsylvania in 1830, having served local militia, he raised a regiment of Montgomery County militia in April of 1861 to serve in the Civil War. Hartranft was later named Colonel of the 51st Regiment Volunteer Infantry, participating in several major battles, and rose to the rank of Brigadier General. Following the Civil War, Hartranft was appointed Special Provost Marshall, and given responsibility for the care and final execution of the conspirators convicted in the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln.

Later, Hartranft became Auditor General of Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in 1865 and, served two terms. Thereafter he was elected Governor of Commonwealth in 1872. As Governor, he was involved in the ratification of a new state constitution, the Centennial of Pennsylvania, and such labor issues as railroad strikes and the trials of the *Molly Maguires*.

Following his years as governor, Hartranft was active in various organizations, and was appointed Major General over the Pennsylvania National Guard.

The General, Camp 15's namesake, died on October 17, 1889.



Greetings Brothers of Camp 15, by Commander

I had the pleasure of attending tours of Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, and Salem Church battlefields during the weekend of September 27-28 with the Bucks County Civil War Round Table. The tours were given by Mr. John Roos from Battlefield Tours of Virginia and were excellent to say the least.

One of the stops of the Chancellorsville battlefield was the Visitors Center. In one of the rooms is the listing of soldiers who survived or gave their last full measure on those battlefields (Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Wilderness and Spotsylvania). Those who survived had their picture surrounded in green, and those who died were surrounded in black. As I was gazing over the pictures of the men, I noticed a familiar regiment to all of us. As you can see with the photo below, Cpl. Levi H. Ammon, Co. H, of the 51st Pennsylvania, was killed while fighting in the Battle of the Wilderness.



Other members of the 51st Pennsylvania who gave their lives and are buried at the Fredericksburg National Cemetery are as follows:

- Pvt. Harrison Ackerman, Co. B (Grave #1181)
- Pvt. Philip Bond, Co. B (Grave # 3986)
- 1Lt. John S. Moore, Co. A (Grave #1227)
- Pvt. Frederick Smith, Co. H (Grave # 2482)

Minutes of September 21, 2025 Camp #15 Meeting

At the National Civil War Museum, Lower floor, Educational Center, Harrisburg, PA. Sunday September 21st, 2025. The weather was cloudy and 71 degrees.

Camp #15 Commander, Brother Kyle Purchase opened the meeting according to the SUVCW Ritual. The starting time was 2:18 P.M.

Reading and Approval of Camp Meeting Minutes as printed in the Hartranft Herald:

The Minutes from the last meeting were read by Commander Kyle. A motion was made to accept the minutes as printed in the Hartranft Herald, by Brother Logan and seconded by Brother Chuck. Motion passed.

Treasurer’s Report:

Brother David reported that at the PA. State Encampment he sold six license plates. New Camp #15 expenses included purchasing from the National Quartermaster, some SUVCW Presentation Folders, and grave Flag Folders. The Camp’s internet bill was paid, along with the need to purchase postal stamps for mailing our Camp newsletters. Also motions were made, seconded, and approved for the following items. A \$100 donation to the Civil War Museum, (where we meet), a re-imbursement (\$65) to Brother Logan for the purchase of a special “Last Veteran Grave Marker/Flag Holder”, (for private Israel A. Kent’s grave).

Brother David reported that Camp #15 has three CDs he keeps an eye on. When a particular CD draws close to maturity, it is reviewed and “rolled over”. Brother David shared with the Camp that there is balance of \$571 in the checking account. A motion was made by Brother Kyle and seconded by Brother

Chuck to accept the Treasurer’s report. All Brother’s present approved.

The Report of a sick Brother or a Brother’s family in distress:

Currently, there are no new additions to the list below. Brothers please refer to the latest Hartranft Herald for those who need our continuing prayers. The current list includes payers for Brother David Demmy Sr. as he struggles with health issues, Brother Logan and his family dealing with recent family deaths, Brother Scott Debo’s family, and Ann Ribblett, wife of Camp #15 member Terry Bibblett. Please keep all these Brothers and their families in your prayers.

Committee Reports:

The Visiting & Investigating Committee, no activity. The Grave Registration & Last Veteran Committee had activity as shown below.

Brother Kyle reported this Summer he had the opportunity to register about 15 grave sites from the Harrisburg Cemetery. He was wondering where the information would be for veterans that are buried in Dauphin County?. Knowing this it would be easier to track down Civil War veterans. Brother David suggested checking with the county Veterans Administration Office. [pending].

Camp #15 is sponsoring “Last Civil War Veteran for Juniata County for Israel. A. Kent. He is buried in Niemons Cemetery, 1025 Lauver Road, Richfield, PA. The cemetery is behind the church. The date is October 11th, 2025, 11:00 A.M. Brother Logan reviewed a flyer he designed for this event. Looks great! For those interested in carpooling, it will be available, leaving the Museum around 9:30 A.M. A reminder e-mail about carpooling will be sent out as this event draws closer.

Recruitment Committee:

Brother Kyle reported he has not received any response from the Dauphin County Historical Society. He is looking for a slot for a possible program promoting/recruiting the SUVCW. Camp #15 is always looking for venues to promote our Camp.

Brother Wayne will inquire how the Harrisburg Area Civil War Roundtable do occasional tabling displays.

These events are located at the U.S. Army Center in Carlisle. Also working with a local Sons of the American Revolutionary War group. Possibly reaching out to the Camp Curtain Civil War Roundtable, to see what events they are involved in regarding recruiting new members?

Commander Purchase will contact Camp #15 member Brother Greg Kline to see if Brother Kyle & Brother Logan can be included to be “admin-
administrators” (gain access for posting events, etc.), in the Facebook Page for Camp #15.[pending]
Reading and disposing of orders, communications, and bills:

In review, all orders from the Pennsylvania Department, and the National Office SUVCW, are collected by Brother David Demmy Sr. and e-mailed to our members to view. Brothers check emails in your inbox to view! But if you missed an order, go to the Pennsylvania Dept., SUVCW web page, and also the national site for the SUVCW, [indicated on cover of each monthly newsletter] and you can see them all! Many of these new Orders, whether from National or PA Department, deal with the new administration in each area, addressing the newly elected and appointed Brothers and their position in the SUVCW. Other big news is the location of the PA Dept. SUVCW 2026 Encampment. It will be June 25 to 27, 2026 in Carlisle, PA. The National Encampment will be July 30 to August 2, 2026 in Gettysburg PA. Another order had to deal with information on Remembrance Day in Gettysburg.

New Business:

No flags were present at our Memorial Day event. Fortunately, various Camp #15 Brothers had some in their possession, and we used them. Thank you Brothers! But before next Memorial Day, we need to check if any are being provided for our use. Also contacting the American Legion could lead to some flag sources.

Discussion about Camp #15 hosting a 2025 Christmas Party? Possibly interfacing with the Sunbury Camp. It is suggested to have it on December 14th, which is the second Sunday in December.

It's that time of the year again for Camp #15 officers nominations', and election. Refer to the first sheet of the Hartranft Herald. The elected positions include the Camp Commander down the list to the Patriotic Instructor. If you have any interest in a position, please contact Commander

Kyle or Secretary Brother Wayne Blattner. If you desire to run for any of the positions your name will be placed on the ballot. A question will be asked of you being, “If elected will you serve in the position you are running for” **As always, new faces are always welcome!**

Good of the Order:

Brother Wayne & Brother David attended the PA Department Encampment in June in Cranberry Township. Brother Wayne also is looking forward to the first weekend in October, because he will be attending the Fall Conference of the Antietam Institute. The programs will focus on the families and farms of Sharpsburg during and after the battle. Brother Logan enlightened the group on the process of cleaning gravestones. Quite an operation! The Fall issue of the “Battle Cry of Freedom” is due. Brother Wayne will email Camp #15 submission to Department Sr. Vice Commander Ted Zeman for publication. Brother Wayne shared a rough copy of what Camp #15 submission will look like in the publication. Commander Kyle was involved with a presentation at the Newtown Historic Association and spoke about the SUVCW. Also Brother Kyle assisted in the installation of eight tombstones in the Harrisburg Cemetery. Brother Chuck visited the Sons of Confederate Veterans Camp in Gettysburg, to see how they handle recruiting new members. Brother Kyle spoke about The Pennsylvania Veteran Reserves Corps, (PVRC) event in Mechanicsburg. The event was posted on Face book. Please Take Note:

That the Susquehanna Associations S. of V. will meet in Harrisburg on Wednesday Eve, April twenty-three, at eight o'clock, in the rooms of camp 15, Harrisburg.

The 30th anniversary of Capt. E. M. Ruhl camp No. 33 [York] Sons of Veterans celebrated Tuesday evening March 18th by holding banquet at the "Q" restaurant.

Honoring Lincoln, Brothers of Camp 87 [Middletown] attended the Lincoln Exercises held by Gen. John F. Hartranft Camp No. 15, of Harrisburg, Wednesday evening in the hall College Block, 4th Street.

We all know that it is important to pay Camp dues but many a member don't realize this until he is in need and not in good standing.

Seven gross of flags [144] were ordered by Meade Camp No 16 for the purpose of decorating the soldiers' graves on Memorial Day, who are buried in the cemeteries around Reading.

Appomattox Day was very appropriately observed by *Sons of Veterans* of Reading at barracks of D. Co. S. V. R. Tuesday evening April 8, with speeches by members of G.A.R. and *Sons of Veterans*. Lunch followed the celebration.

Bro. Lerley, foreman in the steel Department of the local car works, who met with a painful injury several days ago, by being hit with a flying rivet, is at his work again.

A 12 ½ cent 'shin plaster' note issued by borough of Mechanicsburg in January 1843, is one of the numerous curiosities n [sic] the currency line owned by Bro. Stager of Camp 87.

We acknowledge receipt of Order No 1, Series 1913, Iowa Division, *Sons of Veterans*. These orders are printed on a folder about 6x9 which is the proper way. Camps can easily file these away and have them ready for reference in a short time. This we think is a great improvement over the Pennsylvania Division which prints its orders in the Banner, making it inconvenient to file away.

Page 3 of the February 2004 *Hartranft Herald* displayed the badge of the Final Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic 1949. Because there were only 6 GAR Delegates in attendance, many people are of the impression that very few badges were made! I have not been able to find out the production number, but I do know quite a number were struck. Many people attending the Encampment were able to buy badges and some were sold to the public. This is not unusual, as the GAR had done the same thing at a number of the Encampments. Upon the Delegates receiving their badges, members of the Allied Organizations were able to purchase badges from the inventory.

As your GAR Historian, I have been asked by a number of the members of Camp 15 to print in the *Hartranft Herald* several articles about the Badges, the GAR boys, wore through the years. I will start with the membership badges and show some basic changes over the years. There were numerous minor changes, so I will not go into deep detail, but if anyone wants further information on the subject please contact me. Thanks!

First Installment of a Series on GAR Badges

FIRST OFFICIAL MEMBERSHIP BADGE OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

The first Badge adopted was a shield, upon which was engraved the insignia of the different arms of the army, the navy, and the flags; also the letters 3. B. N. —G. A. R., meaning "Third Battalion" Grand Army of the Republic. This information is found in the Book "History of George Meade Post No. One, Dept of Penna. GAR, by Joseph Chandler Ward, Phila. 1889. Figure #1 below details the Badge while Figure #2 [in gold] is the actual size of the Badge, (the size of a dime). This badge is a reproduction of about 1870 period, said to be from

the original dyes. I have owned 3 originals and they were not flat, but slightly curved from side to side. All were in gold with red, white and blue enamel. The pin on the back was T bar shaped from top to bottom and the pin extended a ¼ inch below the badge.



The following ad was in the

Great Republic Newspaper of Washington D.C.

January 3, 1867.

The Grand Army of the Republic Badge Manufacturing Company, with headquarters at La Fayette, Indiana, are now prepared to furnish Badges of all kinds and qualities at the shortest notice. We have been designated by the Commander in Chief as the sole and exclusive manufacturers of Badges for the Grand Army. A caveat has been filed and a patent applied for, to protect us from the sharks, which remained in the rear during the war, but are now anxious to step forward and reap the profits of our work. All members of the Badge Company are members of the G.A.R. in good standing. A large percent of the profits are paid to National Headquarters for charitable purposes. We furnish Badges of the following kinds and the prices stated: Silver-plated Badges...50, Genuine Silver Badges...\$1.00, heavy Gold-Plated Badges...\$2.50. Genuine Solid Gold Badges made to order from \$10 to \$25, according to fineness and enamel. This is the only company authorized to make & sell Badges for the Grand Army.

This ad was set in block form in the original newspaper. This company had ads in the paper for several years. Yes, there were other variations of the 3BN-GAR Badge. I have seen some that were engraved by Jewelers.

The GAR was also working on a 3BN-GAR 'Officer' Badge. The Circular No. 6, (displayed next page), dated January 4, 1869 was sent to all GAR Posts. In all the years of research neither I, nor any of my GAR buddies, have ever seen this badge. We believe it was never manufactured! I acquired the other badge, shown here, many years ago, and as far as is known, it is the only one in existence today.



It is the opinion of the collectors I have known over the years, that this was a prototype and was never manufactured.

The overall length is 3 inches. The 'circle' [as illustrated above] was to hold the officers rank within the organization. The ribbon is red, white, and blue.

I still own the circular displayed below, but not the badge!
